

Winter Safety In The Home

With the winter season fast approaching us, you are reminded to take certain precautions so we can all focus on the enjoyments of the

season. When it comes to our homes, there are a few items we should consider.

Firstly, our home heating systems may require some type of maintenance inspection program in order to ensure the proper operation and safety of these appliances. If we have a wood stove or other solid-fuel burning appliance, we should have the units checked to ensure doors close tightly and the exhaust piping is both intact and safe to use. These appliances should be checked and cleaned regularly to ensure the piping is not restricted in any way.

The installation of Smoke Detectors is a must. If we use wood stoves, propane appliances and fireplaces, Carbon Monoxide Detectors are also a safe and reliable early warning system for your safety.

What Is Carbon Monoxide?

Carbon monoxide (CO) is a harmful gas that has no colour, smell or taste.

CO forms whenever you burn fuel such as propane, natural gas, gasoline, oil, coal and wood. It is also contained in second-hand smoke. If furnaces, fireplaces, gas stoves or water heaters are improperly installed, or if they malfunction, they can release CO into your home.

What Are The Health Effects?

CO can cause health problems before people even notice that it is present.

When you breathe in CO, it reduces your body's ability to carry oxygen in the blood. Even at low levels of exposure, CO can cause headaches and make you feel tired. The health effects at higher levels can be much more serious and can even lead to death.

Winter Driving Conditions Are Fast Approaching

With the winter and snow trying to make its presence known, we must be prepared for driving in the winter season. Stay alert, slow down and stay in control.

Here are some winter driving tips

~We must make sure to have our vehicles properly prepared with a winter maintenance check-up. We should check or have checked our battery, belts, hoses, radiator, oil, lights, brakes, tires, exhaust system, heater/defroster, wiper and ignition systems.

~ Making sure we have the proper tires to go with the road conditions should be high on our list. Remember, to check tire pressure frequently, as it decreases in cold weather.

~ We must make sure we clear snow and ice from our windows, lights, mirrors, and the roof of our vehicles before starting out. Allow the fog to clear from the interior of our windows so we have good visibility all around.

~ Having a road emergency kit in your vehicle is a good idea and provides a higher level of safety to everyone in your vehicle.

Some recommended items in our road emergency kits include:

- Ice scraper/snowbrush
- Shovel
- Sand or other traction aid
- Tow rope or chain
- Booster cables
- Road flares or warning lights
- Gas line antifreeze
- First aid kit
- Fire extinguisher
- Small tool kit
- Extra clothing and footwear
- Blanket
- Non-perishable energy foods
- Candle and a small tin can
- Matches

Installing and Hanging Christmas Decorations

- When it comes to Christmas decorations, make sure all of your actions are done in a safe manner.
- Having a proper ladder that is properly positioned will make the process a safe and confident one.
- Making sure your lights are properly plugged in and the circuits are not overloaded. Also, making sure any light purchases are CSA approved.

Neighbourhood Watch - Happy Anniversary



Believe it or not it has been just over a year since the Neighbourhood Watch (NW) steering committee came into being with the support of both the Town Council and the R o y a I N e w f o u n d I a n d Constabulary. If you have driven around town lately you may have seen the signs appearing in a number of areas. The committee decided, initially, to move slowly and support a small number of pro-

active residents in getting their NW areas established. Despite the low key approach, here is what has been accomplished to date:

NWs have been established (1) or identified as already existing (2) in the following areas:

- Dogberry Hill Road Extension 1
- ·Salty Place 1
- ·Olympic Drive, Pratt Place & Princeton Place 1
- •Knapps Road, Bickerstaff Road, Balda Place and the area of Old Broad Cove Road spanned by these three side streets 1
- ·Country Gardens 2
- Dogberry Hill Subdivision (Jenny Lynn Drive area) 2

·Thorburn Woods Subdivision - 1

- Portugal Cove Road from Anglican Cemetery Road to Whalesback Convenience 1
- Dogberry Hill Road from the three way stop to Mary Ann Place 1
- ·Oliver's Pond Road, Oliver's Pond Place and Peggy Dean Place 2

A NW presentation by the RNC was delivered on three occasions at the town hall. These were attended by those interested in establishing and/or participating in new NW areas.

A successful application was made to the VOCM Cares Foundation to cover the cost of NW street signs and home decals. Fifty signs and 250 decals were purchased and there is still sufficient funding to double that number for the coming year.

Three other areas have expressed interest in forming an NW group but as often happens the people who start things have jobs that cause them to move on and/ or more discussion has to go on so that people understand that establishing an NW area is not a big effort and can pay many dividends.

So, what's next? On behalf of the Steering Committee, I would like to issue an open invitation for anyone in the community who would like to discuss and possibly set up a Neighbourhood Watch in your area to contact our committee secretary (Emir Andrews) either by phone (895-2067) or by e-mail (emir@mun.ca). We can send you some information about NW. Then if you wish to proceed we can arrange a meeting to outline the simple process that is involved. If you go on the web to read about NW, one aspect

of this community that makes our NW areas unique is *that in many sections of the community we are not in areas with homes that can see the four or five homes around them. This means we focus on different things such as what people, animals, vehicles are usual in those driveways, not on actually seeing the houses.*

The steering committee will meet in November to discuss some other initiatives If you think you would like to join the steering committee, please contact us. We do need a couple of new people as at least one of our current members is moving to another province. **Why bother you may ask?** From time to time there are instances of vandalism, theft, tire slashing, gas line cutting and so on that occur within the community. The existence of NW in a community helps to deter these activities and/ or limit their effects.

One of the goals of NW is to make neighbours more aware of the things that they can do to protect themselves. As winter and the holiday season approach here are a few points to consider

If you have a garage:

-have you reset the automatic garage door opener from the factory setting – easy for someone else to have one with the same setting.

-do you unplug the automatic door opener when you are going to be away for some period of time?

Also with respect to being away from home,

i) tell your immediate neighbours so they can watch your home;

ii) discontinue delivery of papers or make sure it is taken in every day and not left filling your paper box or lying on the ground (a sure sign to anyone watching that there is no one at home);

iii) make sure your home looks lived in – lights going on and off at appropriate times, car tracks if there is snow on the ground, a vehicle parked there frequently;

iv) have any flyers being delivered picked up;

v) store valuables in a unique (unexpected) place;

vi) make sure your house is being checked frequently enough to fulfill your insurance requirements (often at least once every 48 hours):
