Council was invited to submit a name of someone in their community who really makes a difference for a special Canada 150 Commemorative Ceremony by MP Nick Whalen. Each recipient received a special certificate and a commemorative Canada 150 pin that included a piece of the original copper from the roof of the Parliament Building. On December 18th, they hosted a ceremony at the Fluvarium to celebrate the recipients, along with Mayors and invited guests. The Town of Portugal Cove-St. Philip's had nominated PCSP Lion Bradley Moss and his daughters, Rachel and Julianne.

Bradley has served countless hours of volunteer work within the community, installed Lions projects across the province, as well as around the world with international humanitarian missions for the Lions International. Bradley expanded his humanitarian work with Team Broken Earth in 2013. He has completed three successful international missions with Team Broken Earth involving week-long, free, vision clinics for over 2,000 citizens in some of the poorest countries throughout the western hemisphere.

On top of his work with the Lions, he contributes countless hours to Rachel and Julianne's Special Project who have shown their own ingenuity and community spirit through a variety of fundraising events and volunteer opportunities. Chamber of Commerce



NEW PCSP CHAMBER OF COMMERCE IS UNDER WAY

PCSP Chamber of Commerce met with St. John's Board of Trade, and other provincial Chamber representatives from Bay St. George, Grand Falls - Windsor, Burin Peninsula and Gander. Meeting was sponsored by Atlantic Chamber of Commerce. The meeting focused on the current economic crisis in the Province and attempted to identify some of the major challenges we face as business leaders. There was a resounding agreement that we were facing real labour and skill shortages .There was also a common call to provincial and municipal government to reduce the tax burden and curb spending. The group agreed the Province needs an influx of new Canadians who are skilled or are willing to be trained and to acquire new skills to fill the current job openings. It was suggested our current K to 12 education system need to upgrade curriculum so our students reach national skill standards in areas such as numeracy, literacy, writing and communication skills. There's a need to promote "first job experiences" with our youth.

PCSP Chamber has volunteered to work with all other Chambers across the province to address the new "Economic Blueprint for NL" a strategy to promote business development in NL. Our Chamber has agreed to become a member of the Atlantic Chamber in order to network and connect with business leaders across the region.

At the recent Town budget consultations the Chamber presented a brief study and analysis of our current tax burden and the ever expanding expenditures in the Towns budget over the past number of years. PCSP in comparison to other similar sized communities across the province is well above the average in both tax levels per household and dollars spent by the Town. There was a request made for the Town to reduce expenditures and reduce taxes at the consultation session. The Chamber intends to reach out to the current Council and to suggest ways and to achieve this goal.

SMOKE and CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS



SMOKE ALARMS

Remember to check the date and replace smoke alarms every 10 years. NFPA's survey data shows that the public has many misconceptions about smoke alarms, which may put them at increased risk in the event of a home fire. For example, only a small percentage of people know how old their smoke alarms are, or how often they need to be replaced.

Based on the survey data the fire prevention week slogan for this year addressed smoke alarm replacement with a focus on these key

- Smoke alarms should be replaced every 10 years.
- Make sure you know how old all the smoke alarms are in your
- To find out how old a smoke alarm is, look at the date of manufacture on the back of the alarm; the alarm should be replaced 10 years from that date.

The Portugal Cove - St. Philip's Fire Department wishes to stress to you the importance of regular operational checks of your smoke alarms and checking them to ensure they are not out of date. Smoke alarms are your first line of defense against a fire in your home and you need to know they are in good operating condition.

CARBON MONOXIDE ALARMS

Do you use propane appliances for heating and cooking? Do you burn wood for home heat or fireplaces? Do you have an oil fired

furnace or other oil fired heating appliances? If so, be aware they produce carbon monoxide and the potential exists for an unknown release within your home, especially if the appliance venting is leaking or blocked, or malfunctioning. Newfoundland and Labrador has seen a number of persons become very sick and unfortunately deaths have occurred as a result of this silent killer.

Carbon Monoxide (CO) is a colorless, odorless gas that can cause accidental poisoning or even death if not quickly detected. A working Carbon Monoxide Alarm will sound when the gas reaches an elevated level, alerting you and your family to the danger.

Signs and symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning may include:

- Dull headache
- Dizziness
- Shortness of breath
- Blurred vision
- Weakness
- Nausea or vomiting
- Confusion
- Loss of consciousness

The PCSP Fire Department encourages you to have all fuel burning appliances and heating systems inspected by qualified personnel regularly. Ensure that your carbon monoxide alarms are properly installed and working, and most importantly, be vigilant for the signs of carbon monoxide poisoning.

Don't Block Fire Hydrants

Residents are reminded not to block fire hydrants. Recently, the PCSPVFD could not readily access a fire hydrant during an emergency call. This situation slows the response time of your fire department which can have serious consequences during an emergency. As well, the Highway Traffic Act

Article 144; (d): vehicles shall not park, within one metre from the point on the curb or edge of the roadway immediately opposite a fire hydrant;

Further, Article 149 of the Highway Traffic Act advises that where a vehicle interferes with firefighting, it may be removed by order of authorized officials.

Your fire department asks that you please be respectful of where you park in those areas of our Town protected by fire hydrants. It may not be convenient to park a little further away, but it is more inconvenient to have your vehicle ticketed or towed.

Your fire department will make all reasonable efforts to avoid such an inconvenience for vehicle operators, but if a vehicle clearly is an impediment to the operational needs of the fire department in accessing the hydrant then appropriate steps must be taken.

Please respect the law and do not block hydrants.

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



2018 BUDGET
