5. City of St. John Proposed Amendment to the St. John U rban Region Regional Plan

The Planning Department is in receipt of a letter from the City of St. John proposing to amend the St. John Urban Region Regional Plan to re-designate land located at 30 Barrows Road from Public Open Space to Urban Development for the development of two single dwellings. 36 Barrows Road is also proposed to be rezoned in the same fashion as it would be the only remaining parcel of Open Space along this section of Barrows Road.

Public Works Committee Report for April 11, 2018 – presented by Councillor Bartlett

1. Grand Concourse Authority (GCA) 2018 Maintenance Agreement

Committee was advised of the 2018 trail maintenance fees for Voiseys Brook trails. As a condition of membership, trails constructed by the GCA are maintained by GCA. Maintenance services include mowing, litter collection, vegetation removal, surface structure repairs and maintenance and repairs to all walk amenities. This is a budgeted item for 2018.

Motion Bartlett/Laham

2018-119 Resolved that the 2018 service fees for Voiseys Brook Trails by the Grand Concourse Authority in the amount of \$17,485.53 plus HST be approved.

Carried Unanimously

2. Waste Management

a. Eastern Regional Service Board Comparison Committee requested an analysis of inhouse Waste Management service costs in comparison to the same level of service if handled by the Eastern Regional Service Board. Staff advised once a new Director of Public Works is hired, this request can then be fulfilled.

b. Solid Waste Presentation - In June 2016 the Multi-Materials Stewardship Board (MMSB) conducted an audit of the Town waste management program for the purpose of understanding diversion and capture rates with respect to garbage and recycling. In 2017, Ashley Burke of the MMSB, presented the audit outcomes and recommendations for consideration. Ms. Burke has been invited to present again to the new Council and Mayor on June 20th.

3. Road and Storm Water Issues

a. Portugal Cove Cross Culvert

Mayor McDonald confirmed following recent discussions with the Department of Transportation and Works that an appointed Engineer from Transportation and Works will be onsite within the next week to assess the area in question and determine an outcome for amicable resolution.

b. Tuckers Hill Road

Staff advised no response has been received following correspondence sent to Transportation and Works on February 14th requesting interim solution to traffic hazards at the bottom of Tuckers Hill Road and Thorburn Road. Public Works will follow up with an email requesting a reply.

c. Dogberry Hill Road Ext.

Councillor Bartlett was asked to have to have a culvert assessed for proper drainage on Dogberry Hill Road Ext. Staff advised the area in question has previously been assessed and no issues of concern were noted.

d. Drover Heights

Following receipt of correspondence and subsequent emails from residents in Drover Heights with respect to storm water issues, a thorough assessment of the site has been conducted with the following findings:

The property in question was built well below the road grade and the slope of the driveway inevitably created a natural drainage path thus causing water issues. As this is not the result of any action by the Town, remediation of the water issues would be the property owner responsibility.

Should the Town move forward with the installation of water and sewer in Drover Heights, this would cause disruption to the existing road and at that time redirection of the road water could be taken into consideration.

4. Director of Public Works

Resumes are still being accepted for the position; those currently received have not been reviewed.

Economic Development, Marketing, Communications & Tourism Committee report for April 11, 2018 by Councillor Neary

1. Community and Regional Tourism Signage

The Director updated the committee on meetings held between town staff, the Province, ACOA and the City of St. John on regional signage funding. We continue to collaborate with all partners to determine the scope of the project and the eligible components. The goal is to develop a joint funding application to be submitted within the next month. The project will have an open competition with a Request for Proposals to complete the work.

2. Advisory Committee on the Environment

ACE has requested that Council consider appointing an interim Chair as current Chair Dick Whitaker will be taking a leave of absence for personal reasons. ACE members were engaged to determine who would be interested. The EDMCT Committee discussed some options.

Motion Neary/Bartlett

2018-120 Resolved that that Sonya Rideout and Rita Anderson be named Interim Co-Chairs for the Advisory Committee on the Environment.

Carried Unanimously

We have received notification from Conservation Corps that our Green Team project has not only been approved, but, NL Hydro has chosen to sponsor the project cost of \$3500. As a result we will also now be able to fund an additional two weeks for our project lead.

3. Municipal Awareness Day

Due to some scheduling conflicts with the school Municipal Awareness Day will now take place on Tuesday May 8th

4. Regional Transportation Plan

Additional information was shared regarding the requested funds by Metrobus and the expected deliverable should the Town proceed. A \$10,000 contribution would solely focus on the town in clusion in a survey to determine the demand for regional transportation. As this was not a budgeted item, and is limited in scope, the town will not be proceeding with this project at this time. However, will continue to explore and consider regional transportation solutions that would benefit PCSP.

5. Chamber of Commerce

The Town has been advised that the Kevin Collins fundraising concert for the School Lunch Association has been canceled. The deadline for inclusion in the Business Directory has been set at Thursday, May 10th.

6. Earth Day in a Box

The committee considered correspondence from Newfoundland Power regarding Earth Day in a Box. Newfoundland Power is supporting municipalities in reducing paper waste for Earth Day through a campaign that will reward the municipality with the largest number of residents to sign up for paperless billing with NL Power (per capita) with a prize pack, as well as providing individual prizes. We will be taking part in this campaign.

7. Municipal grant for town staff position

Correspondence from FCM highlighted a funding opportunity due June 29th. The funding program is meant to support and encourage municipal work in climate change adaptation. As we are currently involved in two projects with this focus we are eligible to receive reimbursement for existing staff time on this topic. An application will be completed.

8. Drover Heights

Communications will be sent inviting residents of Drovers Heights to a meeting regarding a potential water and sewer project. The date is still being finalized.

9. Heritage Advisory Committee

Committee discussed options for potential locations for a boat building workshop including, a space below Landings Restaurant. Details and logistics are still being considered.

10. Ferry Terminal Road Name Request

As a result of Council direction, following the decision not to change the portion of Portugal Cove Road in front of Landings Restaurant to Ferry Terminal Road, the Director of Economic Development has been supporting the owner of the restaurant to clarify the street name with google and TripAdvisor. Despite these efforts, the owner is still advocating for Council to reconsider the request.

11. Media Training

Staff is currently looking into options for specific media training for public bodies to support Council.

Protective Services Committee report for April 10, 2018 – presented by Councillor Hanlon

1. Commissionaires – Municipal Enforcement

The Municipal Enforcement Officer offered the following update on activity since the last Committee meeting:

- Investigation on 2 barking dog complaints have been completed and notification sent to residents.
- Commercial vehicle parked on Town property at 8 White Ash Drive. Public Works has been notified regarding environmental concerns and possible blocking of access to property.
- Monitoring vehicles loitering in area of Rainbow Gully parking lot, and reports of threats uttered toward Town employee.
- Night patrols are reporting a number of vehicles throughout Town late at night, suspicious activity including driving without head lights, stopping in odd places, following the patrol vehicle. No reports of recent break-ins from RNC on patrol in Town.

Ongoing:

- Civic Numbering assessments being publicized through Town website, social media and Tickle newsletter.
- Traffic monitoring on Blagdon Hill and Newbury Street.
- Traffic Regulations.

MEO and Town Manager received a note of thanks from resident for the services of the Town's Municipal Enforcement Officer.

Commissionaires will be providing safety services for the Environment Fair on April 21st. The main fair is taking place at St. Lawrence Parish and the Fire Department is holding demonstrations across the street at the Portugal Cove Road Station.

3. SafePCSP

The Committee discussed the installation locations for the SafePCSP billboards and the request for the purchase of more safety vests. The Committee agreed to purchase more vests and funding for the purchase is a budgeted item.

2. Director of Public Works Position

3. Crown Land – Resident refund request

Committee received correspondence from a resident requesting a refund of all municipal taxes paid since the amalgamation of the Town. This request is a result of the resident applying for title to the land and being rejected by NL government.

Committee has asked staff to send a letter to the the resident and the Assistant Deputy Minister of the Land Branch of the Department of Municipal Affairs and Environment, stating that the town has always considered the land in question to belong to the resident. This will aid the resident in applying for a quick claim to deed.

4. Remaining Multi Year Capital Funds

The committee discussed a meeting date for residents of Drovers Heights to vote if they want to proceed with the water & sewer installation project in their area. The Director of Economic Development, Marketing and Communications will be organizing this event.

8. Unoccupied Lots

The committee discussed a few tax structure issues including a two tier system for vacant land water and sewer and a potential different tax for vacant land. Revenue effects of these changes is to be explored and brought back to a future meeting.

Item # 1:

Civic # 18-28 Mitchell's Pond Place Demolition & Single Dwelling Zoning: Residential Medium Density (RMD) – Unserviced

The Committee recommends that the application for Civic # 18-28 Mitchell's Pond Place be granted approval in principle, permitting the demolition of a dwelling and accessory building, and construction of a single dwelling. Approval in principle shall be in full compliance with the Town's Municipal Plan & Development Regulations and all other regulatory bodies of government, specifically Development Regulation 49 (Non-Conforming Use), Schedule C: Residential Medium Density, and Schedule E: Environmental Protection Overlay.

The Administrator recommended that Council use their discretion to grant approval in principle to this application.

Item # 2:

Civic # 1303-1309 Thorburn Road Patio/Deck Zoning: Residential Medium Density (RMD) – Serviced

The Committee recommends that the application for Civic # 1303-1309 Thorburn Road be granted approval in principle, permitting a patio/deck. Approval in principle shall be in full compliance with the Town's Municipal Plan & Development Regulations and all other regulatory bodies of government, specifically Development Regulation 49 (Non-Conforming Use) and Schedule E: Environmental Protection Overlay.

The Administrator recommended that Council use their discretion to grant approval in principle to this application.

Item # 3:

Civic # 34 Oliver's Pond Place Business Zoning: Residential Low Density (RLD) – Unserviced

The Committee recommends that the application for Civic # 34 Oliver's Pond Place be granted approval in principle, permitting the establishment of a stand-alone boarding house residential business (bed and breakfast with day spa). Approval in principle shall be in full compliance with the Town's Municipal Plan & Development Regulations and all other regulatory bodies of government, specifically Plan Policy RES-3 (Land Uses), Development Regulation 33 (Notice of Application), Development Regulation 102 (Discretionary Uses), Schedule C: Residential Low Density, and Schedule D: Off-Street Parking Requirements. The Administrator recommended that Council use their discretion to grant approval in principle to this application.

Other Items Discussed:

Item # 5:

Civic # 1614-1616 Portugal Cove Road – Application for Business

The Committee reviewed an application to change the use of an existing building from residential to commercial to establish a convenience store (specialty shop – humidity control products) at this location.

The Committee requested that this application be held pending Staff corresponding with the applicant regarding the requirement for submission of the information requested within 8 weeks in accordance with Development Regulation 19 (Deferment of Application).

Item # 6:

Civic # 65-71 Western Gully Road – Application to Subdivide Property and Construct Single Dwelling

The Committee discussed an application to subdivide property and construct a single dwelling at this location that proposed to service two dwellings from one on-site well and septic system.

The Committee requested that this item be held pending Staff contacting the applicant to discuss options for compliant development of the property.

Item # 7:

Civic # 201A Beachy Cove Road – Land Use Zone Readjustment

On January 16, 2018 the Committee met with a property owner and discussed potentially moving the Traditional Community zoning line to include this property.

Staff advised the Committee that correspondence had been received from the Heritage Advisory Committee suggesting moving the zoning boundary for Portugal Cove to include Beachy Cove and Ridge Road. The Committee requested that this item be held pending Staff contacting the Heritage Programs & Services Coordinator for further clarification regarding the correspondence.

Item # 8:

Civic # 31-51 Hogan's Pond Road – Wetland Delineation

The Planning Department is in receipt of a report from Stantec Consulting Inc. regarding the delineation of a wetland (in accordance with Schedule E: Environmental Protection Overlay Condition # 6) for the potential construction of single dwellings.

The Committee requested that this item be held pending a discussion between the Town Manager and the Advisory Committee on the Environment to discuss the proposal.

Item # 9:

Civic # 77-81 Tolt Road – Meeting with the Committee

The Committee met with residents and discussed a rodent problem they are experiencing on their property that they believe is being caused by bird feeders on an adjacent property.

Staff advised the Committee that they had completed a site visit and emailed pictures, along with a request to reopen the file, to Service NL. Staff also advised that they had received a response from Service NL indicating that they would follow up with the property owner of Civic # 69-75 Tolt Road.

The Committee requested that this item be held pending receipt of further correspondence from Service NL and discussions with property owners on either side of Civics # 69-75 & 77-81 Tolt Road to see if they have been experiencing any rodent problems.

Item # 10:

Meeting with the Committee – Tiny Homes

The Committee met with developers to discuss potential development of tiny homes within the Town.

The Committee discussed the possibility of creating Regulations regarding tiny homes within the Town and advised that they would look into the potential Regulations during a comprehensive review of the Town Plan & Development Regulations.

Item # 11:

Civics # 1777 & 1779-1781 Portugal Cove Road – Request to Extend Permits

The Planning Department is in receipt of a request to extend the Site Preparation Permits for these properties. The approvals in principle for the development of single dwellings on these lots expired on February 26, 2018.

The Committee advised Staff to extend the approvals in principle for a further year and to advise the applicant that Building Permits must be issued within the one year extension or new applications will be required for Council's review.

Item # 12:

Civics # 17-19 Hibbs Place – Structure Under Construction

The Planning Department is in receipt of correspondence regarding a dwelling extension under construction on this property.

The Committee advised Staff to respond to the correspondence received advising that a permit has been issued for the dwelling extension and that it is compliant with the Town's Municipal Plan & Development Regulations.

Item # 13:

Bickerstaffe Road Extension – Request to Reduce Asphalt Width

The Planning Department is in receipt of a request to allow a reduction in the minimum asphalt width for an extension to Bickerstaffe Road from 6 m to 5 m for the driving lanes and from 15 m to 12 m for the turnaround as a wider asphalt width would require ditch work to be completed on adjacent properties and the reduced width would match the existing surface of Bickerstaffe Road.

The Committee requested that it is item be held pending Staff contacting the applicant and advising of options for development to comply with the Town's standards.

Item # 14:

Steep Slope Regulations

The Committee discussed regulations regarding development within steep slopes areas identified within Schedule E: Environmental Protection Overlay.

The Committee requested that this item be held pending a meeting between the Committee and the Advisory Committee on the Environment.

Item # 15:

Civics # 167-169A & 167-169B Beachy Cove Road – Information Regarding Right-of-Way

The Committee discussed a right-of-way across Civic # 167-169A Beachy Cove Road used to access Civic # 167-169B Beachy Cove Road and past development activity at Civic # 167-169B Beachy Cove Road.

The Committee requested that this item be held pending further discussion.

Item # 16:

Civics # 7-9 Anglican Cemetery Road Extension – Dwelling Extensions

The Committee discussed processing of an application for dwelling extensions which were approved by Council and permits have been issued.

The Committee requested that this item be held pending further discussion.

Item # 17:

Potential Amendment to Development Regulation # 10 (Discretionary Powers of Council)

The Committee discussed potentially amending Development Regulation # 10 to allow development at Council's discretion under certain conditions.

This item was held at the January 9, 2018 Council meeting for 90 days while public meetings were held and information gathered. This 90 day period ended on April 9th, 2018.

A member of the Committee advised that draft amendment wording will be presented to Staff at the next Committee meeting for use to prepare a Report for Council's review during consideration of the proposed amendment.

Item # 18:

Potential Increase to Maximum Street Lengths

The Committee discussed a potential increase in the maximum street lengths for serviced and unserviced streets beyond 300 m (984 ft).

The Committee requested that this item be held pending referral to the Public Works Department and Fire Department for comments regarding the proposed extension.

Councillor Hanlon left the meeting prior to discussion of Item # 19 due to potential conflict of interest.

Item # 19:

Baccalieu Horizon Residential Subdivision (West Point Road) – Second Sewer Video Inspection The Committee discussed the outcome of the second sewer video inspection completed within the Baccalieu Horizon Residential Subdivision in preparation of the placement of the surface course asphalt within the development.

A consensus amongst the Committee could not be reached during this meeting on any potential future action regarding this matter to be taken by the Town.

Councillor Hanlon returned to the meeting after discussion of Item # 19.

Item # 20:

Old Broad Cove Road East Residential Development Scheme – Meeting to Discuss Proposed Changes

Staff requested to schedule a meeting with the Committee to discuss finer details regarding the development scheme than what was previously discussed with Council as a whole.

The Committee advised that a meeting be scheduled and for Staff to forward an invitation for this meeting to all members of the Committee.

Item # 21:

Civic # 115 Dogberry Hill Road – Parking of Commercial Vehicles

The Committee discussed concerns received regarding parking of commercial vehicles that may be associated with an alleged siding business operating from an accessory building.

The Town Manager contacted Municipal Enforcement requesting that they drive by during the night to identify if any activity is on-going. Checks were performed over a one week period after 11:00 pm and no evidence of heavy equipment activity was identified.

Item submitted for information.

Item # 22:

Department of Municipal Affairs and Environment Flood Risk Mapping Study

The Committee discussed concerns regarding a Flood Risk Mapping Study completed by the Department of Municipal Affairs and Environment, particularly related to documentation submitted to the Town from a property owner in the Mercer's Road area.

Staff advised the Committee that the Town Manager had contacted the Department and was awaiting confirmation of the meeting. The Committee requests that this item be held pending scheduling of the meeting.

Item # 23:

Civic # 24-26 King's Hill Road – Removal Order

The Committee discussed a Removal Order placed on the dwelling and accessory building due to safety concerns regarding the condition of the structures. The deadline for compliance was April 11, 2018. Staff performed a site visit on April 12, 2018 and confirmed that the Order had not been complied with.

Staff advised the Committee that the property owner had scheduled a meeting for the following day to submit an application for development of the property. The Committee requested that this item be held pending the results of this meeting.

Councillor Harding left the meeting prior to discussion of Item # 24.

Item # 24:

Civic # 24 Keeley Lane – Removal Order

The Committee discussed a Removal Order placed on development activity completed without a permit. The deadline for compliance was April 15, 2018. Staff did not complete a site visit to check compliance as Council passed a Motion at the April 3, 2018 meeting to approve a Crown Land referral that would lead to the issuance of permits for this development.

The Committee advised Staff that the Removal Order remains in effect until such time that permits for the developments can be issued; however, no further action is required at this time.

Councillor Harding returned to the meeting after discussion of Item # 24.

Item # 25:

Alternative Sewage Systems

The Committee discussed a meeting with a representative for the Blivet System. The Committee also discussed an application recently submitted for a residential subdivision that would incorporate this system.

Sports Coordinator (Item #1 only)

1. Sports Facilities Sponsorship and Revenue

Nick Miller, Sports Coordinator presented at the Chamber of Commerce Meeting on Wednesday, April 18th regarding "Sponsorship and Sport Tourism" opportunities and the positive effects of this industry on our business community. The response from the Chamber was very positive as well as enlightening to the members. Nick will follow up over the next few weeks and mail a sponsorship package to all Chamber members. The Chamber has also agreed to post the information on its website and any other social media platforms they avail off.

The projected revenue for Rainbow Gully Soccer Pitch and Softball Pitch as well as Voisey's Softball Pitch for May to August was presented to the committee. With the Minor Soccer and Minor Softball field rental fees waived, the total projected revenue to date is \$68,625. The donate field time is valued at \$13,560. The total included fees and donations is \$82,185.

2. East Coast Trails

The Recreation Committee reviewed the Memorandum of Understanding between the Town and East Coast Trails Association and would like to put forward the following recommendation:

MOTION: Committee recommends that the Town sign the Memorandum of Understanding with East Coast Trails and allocate \$28,600 towards the re-development of the section of trail in Portugal Cove – St. Philip's.

3. Grand Concourse Authority – Indian Meal Line ROW

The Recreation Director completed a site visit with Jamie Billard, Executive Director of Grand Concourse Authority. The trail is approximately 90% complete the roughed in phase. There have been a couple of concerns from residents whose homes back on the trail. The Recreation Committee will review these concerns once the trial has been completed. In the meantime GCA will prepare a quote for a privacy fence to be installed on the ROW between 2 homes located off Indian Meal Line.

4. Government of Canada Enabling Accessibility Fund

The Recreation Committee discussed possible projects for application under the Enabling Accessibility Fund. Paving of the parking area and walkway inside the park gates at Voisey's Brook as well as replacing the ramp at the Town Hall was suggested. Deadline for the grant is May 24th. If any Councillor would like to make any other suggestions, please let the Director of Recreation and Community Services know via email.

5. Community Grants

After reviewing the Community Grant Application, the Committee would like to put forward the following recommendation:

- MOTION: Committee recommends that the Town waive the rental fee for the Recreation Centre and donate prizes for a fundraiser for Lisa Cooney.
- MOTION: Committee recommends that the Town donate \$100.00 to Jessica Hall to assist with her travels to Halifax, NS, May 4th-6th for Junior NL Basketball Association Regionals.

1. 2018 Fleet Requirements

Committee were provided with a list of vehicles which were approved in budget as additions for the 2018 fleet. The Public Works Foreman, since his involvement in the role, has highlighted operational considerations that would allow the Town to reduce vehicle requirements. He therefore recommends that the town substitutes two of the approved vehicles with others that will better match his operational needs for a significant cost saving. Therefore:

MOTION: Committee recommends the following vehicle purchases be approved:

- 1 One ton pickup truck with plow and sander at a cost of \$56,999 plus HST
- 2 One ton pickup trucks at a cost of \$36,999each plus HST
- 1 Compact SUV at a cost of \$30,999 plus HST

Discussion Items

2. Correspondence from Dogberry Hill Road Ext. Resident

Correspondence was forwarded to the Public Works Division with a request to consider placing a speed hump on Dogberry Hill Road Ext. The complaint will be referred through the Town's Traffic Calming Policy.

Waste Management Solid Waste Presentation
 Staff advised that the presenter from MMSB is only available to present on June 20th at 4:30pm rather than 6:30pm. Committee agreed to this time.

4. Road and Storm Water Issues

- a. Portugal Cove Cross Culvert to date, the Town has not heard from Transportation and Works to schedule an onsite visit with one of their Engineers for the purpose of determining an outcome for amicable resolution. Staff will make contact with T&W to request moving forward on this.
- b. Tuckers Hill Road Staff advised a letter was received from the Minister's office which indicated the request for an interim solution to traffic hazards at the bottom of Tuckers Hill Road and Thorburn Road was passed along to their area supervisors. Public Works will follow up with an email requesting a reply.



c. Drover Heights – The resident who submitted correspondence and subsequent emails with respect to storm water issues in Drover Heights requested that Councillor Bartlett personally conduct a site visit. Councillor Bartlett obliged along with the Foreman of Public Works and also Deputy Mayor Laham. The outcome of the report provided at the Council Meeting of April 17 2018 remains. Remediation of water issues at this property would be the property owner's responsibility. A formal letter will be provided to the residents in response to their complaint.

5. Round Pond Road Path

Question was presented as to why a public right of way providing access to Round Pond has been closed off by a fence. This matter will be forwarded to Planning and Development for review.

6. Crosswalk on Bennetts Road

Question was presented as to why a crosswalk has never been installed linking Sunshine Park parking lot to the adjacent parking lot of Healeys Pond. Staff will contact the City of St. John's for an answer as this area is within the boundaries and control of the City.

5. Traffic Calming Reviews - Update

Public meetings on the traffic calming reviews conducted for Country Garden Road, Olivers Pond Road and Western Gully Road were in the process of being coordinated through the appropriate department, however the Communications Coordinator resigned therefore this was placed on hold. Staff will follow up with the new Communications Coordinator to have this matter moved forward.

Economic Development, Marketing, Communications and Tourism Report Thursday, April 26, 2018 4:30 pm

1. Advisory Committee Updates

The Environment Fair was a great success with an estimated 400 attendees visiting over 30 vendors and 11 workshops. This is a huge increase from previous years and the event has now outgrown the facility. At the event the Mayor also signed a proclamation recognizing "Earth Day". Staff and ACE will look at options for next year. A meeting between ACE and the Planning and Development Committee is being scheduled to discuss steep slopes regulations.

The Heritage Committee has been asked to provide commentary to the Traditional Community Zone regulations. They will be forwarding their input in the coming weeks. The official opening of the Fanny Goff Memorial Site is being planned, the date will be announced shortly.

The Committee discussed the Wooden Boat Museum proposal to provide three Dories for the Regatta. The proposal detailed a plan to finish two, currently unfinished, Dories as a part of a two week workshop and the purchase of one finished Dory. When completed the three finished Dories will replace the existing ones for the PCSP Regatta. The location of the workshop can be a room below Landings Restaurant that opens to the Marina. We can have ten participants take part and propose to charge \$300 each, including meals. It would take place in mid-May. There was a total of \$7,000 budgeted to start replacing the Dories this year. The cost of the boats and the workshop is \$10,000 and will result in a completely new fleet of Dories. The difference of the budget at cost can be made up in the revenue generated from the workshop and through the Heritage budget.

Motion: The Committee recommends that the Town accept the "Provision of Regatta Dories" proposal prepared by the Wooden Boat Museum of Newfoundland and Labrador at a cost of \$9950 and proceed with the purchase of the Dories and workshop.

2. Chamber of Commerce

A new date is being considered for the joint Council and Chamber meeting as some individual schedules conflicted with the planned date. The Director of Economic Development met with the Chamber on Wednesday, April 18th. The deadline to be included in the Business Directory is May 10th and we continue to work collaboratively to sign up as many businesses as possible. Sports Coordinator, Nick Miller, also presented a sponsorship framework for our sports fields to the Chamber, in order to get their input, prior to public rollout.

3. Public Engagement on Development Regulations

Committee discussed the approach to continued engagement for the Regulation 10 amendment. Councilors will discuss the next steps.

4. Media Training

The Director of Economic Development and the Mayor are meeting with a communications consultant recommended by MNL next week to discuss potential options for media training for Council.

5. Drover Heights Water and Sewer Project

Two letters were sent to residents of Drover Heights inviting them to attend a meeting on Monday, April 30th. The meeting will allow Council to speak with residents to determine the interest in the water and sewer project.

6. Tourism Signage and Wayfinding

The Director of Economic Development updated the Committee on the proposed regional signage project. Neighboring municipalities are being invited to join in on the regional design component to the project, separate from the Town's municipally specific signage.

7. Service Level Review

The final version of the Service Level Review will be presented to Council at the next Committee meeting. We have been asked to write a story for Municipal World magazine highlighting the project and potentially another piece in the future as an update.

8. Earth in a Box – NL Power

Currently, we are actively promoting the NL Power program as discussed at the last Council meeting and will continue to do so up until June 22nd when the contest ends.

9. Landings Restaurant Correspondence

The Committee reviewed two pieces of correspondence from Jim Parsons of Landings Restaurant regarding the name change of a section of Portugal Cove Road. The correspondence was notification that further action will be requested in the future to reconsider the name change.



1.0 INTRODUCTION

This document provides a proposal to the Town of Portugal Cove – St.Philips (PCSP) for the Wooden Boat Museum of Newfoundland and Labrador (WBMNL) to provide traditional Newfoundland dories that can be used in the town's annual summer regatta.

WBMNL can provide up to four dories that were constructed as part of the museum's boat building workshop program. At the present time, one dory is ready for use and the other three are in various stages of completion. WBMNL will take advantage of the free work space offered by PCSP in Portugal Cove to complete as many of the unfinished boats as are required. WBMNL will expect PSCP to arrange for painting after.

WBMNL is prepared to complete the dories to a point where painting will be the only step required. If there is sufficient interest and if the work can be scheduled to take place before May 18, 2018, WBMNL is prepared to use the completion of the unfinished boats as an opportunity to offer a mini-workshop for residents of PCSP who are interested in learning some basic boat building skills.

Construction will be supervised by WBMNL Master Boat Builder, Jerome Canning, who will be aided by a WBMNL assistant.

The boat to be provided is a 17 ft. (13 ft. bottom) dory that has been developed for WBMNL workshops (see Figure 1). The dimensions allow for ease in sourcing materials and reasonable effort by workshop participants. This dory is stable on the water and has been proven to be a good recreational boat. The finished boat on offer is presently in the NE Avalon area and is available for inspection or trial use by PCSP.




Figure 2 Parts of the Winterton Dory

3.0 FINANCIAL

3.1 Boat Ownership

At the completion of the program, PCSP will assume ownership of the boats.

3.2 Costing

Standard prices for WBMNL dories will apply.

- Finished and painted boat \$3500
- Finished and unpainted boat \$3000
- Transportation of boats from Winterton to PCSP workshop \$450

Actual cost dependent on the number of boats purchased.

3.3 Workshop Fees

Any workshop fees will be collected and retained by PCSP. As the workshop will cover only the completion of the dories and not every stage of construction, th recommended fee for workshop participants is \$200.

3.4 Payment Schedule

To maintain our cash flow during the program, WBMNL will require payment on a regular schedule of payments as follows:

- Prior to commencement 50%
- Upon completion of the program 50%

RE: Naming of Ferry Terminal Road.

I would like to thank the Council and the Heritage Committee for putting forward their respective opinions on the proposed naming of Ferry Terminal Road.

I especially appreciate the history of Portugal Cove Road. I do however, disagree with the outcome of the vote for the purpose of Heritage or historical value.

It's unfortunate that the demands of today's traffic during the tourist season has not been balanced with the rich history of the road and area.

Today, the Portugal Cove Ferry System is the busiest in all of Newfoundland and Labrador. It does more traffic, from May 24th to Labour Day, than Marine Atlantic in Port aux Basque. It also boasts one of the top tourist destinations in all our province. In 2016, Our phone book listed Bell Island as the Number 1 tourist pick for tourism in the Avalon area.

There is however, a problem with traffic and with tourists finding it, especially Landing's Restaurant. Being presently 1933 Portugal Cove Road, I cannot find a single website or recent map showing it. It's like is simply does not exist. So at best, during peak tourists season, the traffic situation is a mess. A total mess. Please ask Cyril Greeley, the traffic coordinator for the Bell Island Ferry System. He has pleaded with the Province to do something about it. Tourists are totally confused as there is no map, no functioning GPS, and no internet sites that describes the road from Wild Horses to the Ferry Terminal as "Portugal Cove Road". Even the locals that have come to the restaurant don't recognize this road as Portugal Cove Road.

I was hoping that the majority of Council would 1) Correct this traffic mess and confusion and at the same time, 2) Recognize the historical value of the original Portugal Cove Road.

As a business owner, I have plans to help enhance the area, provide a restaurant and shopping experience for tourists and by all means, promote our rich history. I am willing to work with Council, Tour boat operators, hikers, or anyone with a vested interested in making Portugal Cove a pleasurable tourist

experience.

I have attached two pictures taken circa 1950 that shows the original Portugal Cove Road leading to the Ferry docking point and one of the original Portugal Cove Road just before it descended to the Ferry docking point. I also attached a pic of the most recent Map I picked up at staples. It clearly does not identify Portugal Cove Road turning down to the ferry terminal.

I think the area just below House and before the Ferry Terminal would be an excellent place to clean up, place a couple benches and have a write up or monument of some sort pointing out the end of the original Portugal Cove Road and its historical significance to the area. I would personally commit to time in helping out and offer up some staff, on my dime, to help with it.

I feel very strongly that this area, at present, is a traffic nightmare for tourists and I'm saddened that nothing is being committed to properly correcting it.

I believe the time is right to have an intersection out front of Wild Horses that clearly states where Portugal Cove Road ends, Beachy Cove Road begins, and the road to the Ferry Terminal is by turning right via Ferry Terminal Road. This could all tie in to proper ferry traffic lines, and proper traffic flow to those going to the Ferry terminal and to Landings Seafood House and most other websites could rename as is.

I intend to re-apply. And before I do, I will be seeking signatures from locals who support this traffic concept and who never understood the section of Road in question to be Portugal Cove Road. My petition will include a very clear question. Do you understand that the Road from Wild Horses to the Ferry Terminal is known as Portugal Cove Road (Yes or No) and would agree to and support the Road being named Ferry Terminal Road.

I will compile that list and re-submit for a change that makes the entire area clearly named, more tourist friendly and hopefully, commence a project to properly address the historical vale of the original Portugal Cove Road from late 1800's to late the late 1950's.

I hope that we can find a constructive way forward.

Formal request for Action

At our Clubs meeting of April 11 2018, I tabled my observations on the bad driving habits of many drivers in our Province. While putting my thoughts forward, I found that I was not alone and the general membership readily shared their observations and expressed their concerns over lack of a visible police presence especially in school zones and main thoroughfares.

Our decision to take action was an obvious one.

The number of motorists speeding in the metro area and on our highways lends to ask the question why are specific speed limits posted if twenty km and higher over the posted limit is becoming the norm and obviously acceptable?

The running of Red traffic lights is becoming an epidemic and a serious issue for conscientious drivers and pedestrians alike. Turning on a Red light the pedestrian always has the right of way.

Erratic operation of vehicles zig zagging in and out of traffic forcing those drivers maintaining a responsible stopping distance, from the vehicle ahead, to pile on the brakes, making it worse by failing to signal their intention to change lanes.

Driving at speeds as high as 78 km through school zones is outrageous, Fines for those speeds should be a minimum of three hundred dollars. When excessive speed is indicated in a school zone, we need to impound those vehicles for a minimum of fifteen days, an action that just might help quieten traffic.

Did you recently sit behind a vehicle at a traffic light and have to wait until the driver ahead takes their eyes of the phone before they realize other traffic has moved? How many times have you been side by side and observed a driver in the next lane texting away, not having a clue what's going on around them.

Why do some drivers take great pleasure passing in the curb lane in bad weather where pedestrians, especially the young and elderly have no other option of walking available? Too often pedestrians have been absolutely drowned by these inconsiderate operators, and that's totally unacceptable.

Tail gating is a dangerous practice for all motorists often causing chain reactions and serious injuries. The two second rule should apply between vehicles when moving and when stopped at a light, etc. You should be able to see the bottom of the tires of the vehicle directly ahead of you.

Passing on the solid double line is also very common on two lane roadways, Why ?

We all wonder why insurance costs are high, why health care is so high, why first responder suffer the effects of PTSD. All the above are contributing factors.

Speeding - why do we have posted speed limits, what does the word <u>maximum speed</u> refer to? What is the acceptable speed to breach the posted maximum limit? if there is an acceptable amount allowed over the posted limit Where does enforcement start in relation to the maximum limit posted?

Running the Red light is playing Russian Roulette with a 4000 pound vehicle which often leads to death or serious injury.

Erratic vehicle operation (zig zagging through heavy traffic) is a major concern as it indicates that the operator of the vehicle is out of control due to stress, impairment or just don't consider that their actions that often cause serious accidents and stress out other motorists. How often have you left a safe distance between you and the vehicle ahead to have someone pull in necessitating you and those behind you to hit the brakes ?

Driving through school zones with zone warning lights flashing indicating speeds as high as 82 KPH is unacceptable whether school is open or closed. We need to make driving the speed limit a habit. If that means impounding vehicles to correct the problem, so be it.

You do not have to drive far to find someone in front of you or side by side lost in the texting world often without a clue of what's happening around them. Look around and experience it for yourself.

In the curb lane the speed limit should be strictly enforced, it is not a passing lane, in metro or on the highway. In metro areas it is often shared with pedestrians who often fall prey to inconsiderate operators who care not for them.

Tail gating especially when slowing down creates a dangerous situation and leaves no time to react to the unexpected, It's a bad habit, A few seconds between you and the vehicle ahead is prevention.

How often have you seen vehicles passing on a solid line, is this legal I think not but to many drivers do.

All of the above contribute to Death, Pain and Suffering. Planning your drive is the responsibility of the operator. Leave enough time and a little extra so you do not compromise your safety or the safety of others safety.

Listen to VOCM for road updates before starting your morning commute. And enjoy a safe drive.

The scholarships are awarded based on standardized public examination scores for:

- English 3201 and;
- Mathematics 3200 or 3201 and;
- Biology 3201, or Chemistry 3202, or Physics 3204 or Earth Systems 3209
- World Geography 3202, or World History 3201, or Français 3202, Social Studies 3219, or Social Studies 3211

A scholarship score is calculated by the province for all students graduating with an Academic or Honours status. The score is based on the students' performance on the Public Exam only. A student must have completed an exam for at least one course in each of the four categories above.



Application Process

- 1) Application must be in writing to the CEO, on or before <u>August 17, 2018</u>.
