CONSIDERATE GARDENING IN PCSP

Spring is in the air and our thoughts turn to love and gardening. While there are concerns around the use of pesticides for both insect and weed control and for the health of our waterways, there are alternatives to help mitigate the problems.

MAY 6 - 12

Besides a general unease about pesticides, those who are hypersensitive and/or suffer from allergies have an even greater concern. This is where the love comes in. You can care for your friends and neighbours by choosing not to use pesticides and by

employing organic methods of control, tolerating the issues, or even enjoying the 'problem' (e.g. dandelions). Some of which are great friends of pollinating insects. If all else fails and you must use something, do a spot treatment when there is no wind or rain.

ALTERNATIVE CONTROL TIPS:

- Putting a cut off milk carton collar around each of your cabbage family plants to keep cutworms out.
- You can green manure your garden with buckwheat (bees love the flowers), any clover, or even turnip greens. Just grow them to a manageable height and then till them in.
- The liquor from your salt meat bucket will kill stinging nettles.
- Plant African marigolds between your plant rows the smell helps keep insect pests away.
- Top seed your lawn with white clover. It will stay green in dry periods, provide nitrogen for the grass, the flowers smell great and they will feed lots of pollinators.

Happy, loving and considerate gardening! If you need advice check with your local commercial organic gardeners.

Living with Coyotes

There have been several coyote sightings in the town throughout the course of the year - and eastern coyotes are here to stay. An eastern coyote generally has a coat which is a tawny gray colour with black tips, a black-tipped bushy tail, and weighs about 25 to 40 pounds. The animals measure about 4-5 ft. long and about 2 ft. high at the shoulder. Like most animals, coyotes usually have a natural fear of people, but they also possess natural intelligence and can quickly get used to life in residential areas as long as they have access to food.

As long as humans and wildlife respect each others' boundaries, conflicts can be avoided - but we all have to do our part to make sure we don't encourage behavior that could cause problems for wildlife. Although attacks on humans are extremely rare, they can occur if a coyote becomes too comfortable around people and starts associating humans with food.

If coyotes are near your home, cabin or campsite:

- Never leave edible garbage or pet food outside.
- Limit use of birdseed, and pick up fallen fruit.
- Keep pets indoors, or under supervision when outside.
- Have pets spayed or neutered.
- Never attempt to tame a coyote by feeding it.
- Contact a Conservation Officer or other authority if you are having a problem with a coyote.

If a coyote approaches you:

- Stop, remain calm and assess your situation.
- Never approach or crowd the coyote give it an escape route.
- If the coyote seems unaware of you, move away quietly when it is not looking in your direction.
- If the coyote is aware of you, respond aggressively: wave your arms, shout, and maintain eye contact.
- Carry a whistle and blow it to startle the animal.
- Throw rocks or sticks at the coyote.

Dog, Fox or Coyote?

A trotting coyote places its back foot in the print made by the front foot, creating a single, generally straight line of offset prints. Coyote tracks are more oval or elongated than a round dog track, and are usually larger than a fox track.

FIRE SAFETY TIPS FOR YOUR HOME AWAY FROM HOME

Everyone loves a vacation and hospitality services such as AirBNB and vacation rentals by owner are becoming increasingly popular. These vacation homes are not regulated the same wasy as hotels, so being your own safety advocate can be an important part of your trip.

- Check for working smoke alarms in every sleeping area, outside every sleeping area, and on every level.
- Check for portable fire extinguishers, make sure they are easy to reach.
- Check for working CO2 alarms outside
 each sleeping area and on every level.
- Locate a floor plan and note all escape routes and exits.
- Know the address of the home.
- Identify 2 ways out of every room and ensure all doors and windows that lead outside are able to opened.

- Create a meeting place outside the home and a safe distance away.
- Ensure everyone knows how to call
 9-1-1 or the local emergency number from a cell phone outside the home.
- If smoking is allowed, ensure a smoking area has been designated and is well away from the structure. Deep, sturdy ash trays have been provided.
- Check that all pathways are free and clear of trip hazards.
- Check electrical outlets are free from multiple cords and adaptors.
- Keep stove top clear from anything that may catch fire, towels, etc.

WINDOW AND DOOR ALERT!

Be on the lookout for rooms with tiny windows that are too small to use as a means of escape.

Security bars on doors and windows can trap people in a fire. Make sure any security bars have quick-release devices, and that they do not require special keys, tools or efforts to open them.

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO

Ask your host for any additional information about the home and further safety or security concerns.

Check the forecast for the area before you travel, be aware of storms, etc. and be prepared with batteries, medications, etc.

OPEN AIR BURNING IN PCSP

In April 2019, the town experienced several significant grass and brush fires. These fires have posed threats to homes and property, but fortunately to this date, the damage has only been to the natural vegetation. Residents wishing to have an open air fire for the burning of brush or grass during spring clean-up are reminded that this is an extremely dangerous time for doing so. Dead vegetation and dry grass is extremely susceptible to quick fire spread on dry days.

Residents are reminded that a town permit is required at any time during the year for open air burning. These permits are available from the Thorburn Road Fire Station or Town Office reception, from Monday – Friday during office hours.

Note: Permits are issued only for the burning of natural brush and grass, etc. It is not permissible to utilize such a fire to dispose of garbage, building materials or other debris.

Residents are reminded that the 2019 forest fire season is in effect from May 1 to September 30. During forest fire season, you will require 2 permits for any open air burning:

- 1. You must first acquire a permit from the Forestry Office at Paddy's Pond for any open air fires.
- 2. The Forestry permit must be presented in order to acquire the town permit.

We will also be sending out an information flyer to all residents.
