#### PCSP TEACHERS ARE EXCEPTIONAL



PRIME MINISTER'S AWARD FOR TEACHING EXCELLENCE AND TEACHING EXCELLENCE IN STEM - TEACHING BEYOND THE CURRICULUM

Laun Shoemaker Beachy Cove Elementary, Portugal Cove-St. Philip's Mr. Shoemaker has a unique approach to learning. His teaching practice successfully incorporates the "6Cs" - creativity, collaboration, critical thinking, communication, citizenship, and character. He shows students other ways to do things, extending themselves beyond what they thought they could do. He solidifies learning with authentic learning experiences.

Mr. Shoemaker understands the necessity of acquiring technological skills. He uses innovative and exemplary teaching practices within his classroom to enhance learning. To ensure inclusion within the school and to promote science, math, and engineering, Mr. Shoemaker developed a program entitled GRIT (Girls Revelling in Technology), to mirror the BURP program (Boys Undercover Reading Program) previously established.

As a classroom teacher for the past 14 years, Mr. Shoemaker has connected more than 300 of his own learners with community artists and artisans in a wide spectrum of disciplines. He has enlisted singers, dancers, chefs, authors and actors to be part of learning activities.

Securing this broad collaboration from cultural sector was made possible because Mr. Shoemaker successfully procured 37 grants, totaling more than \$180,000, over his teaching career. Through these funds, Mr. Shoemaker has provided more than 6,000 students and 420 teachers with access to amazing resources. The outcome is exceptional. His work has exponential impact not only in the school, but in the entire community.

Ms. Toope is self-effacing, industrious, hardworking, diligent, devoted, and generous. The initiatives she has built during her time teaching at Beachy Cove Elementary will have a lasting impact on students and the community.

Ms. Toope's classroom is where compassion, empathy, understanding and kindness are at the heart of every activity.

She celebrates diversity and challenges students to embrace differences and cultivate change for a better world.

Celebrations such as Pride Week and Every Child Matters makes her classroom one of the most welcoming and empathetic Kindergarten classrooms.

The topics of kindness, diversity and respect are at the forefront of her classroom teaching and learning. She chooses to celebrate differences and encourage love for everyone through classroom activities revolving around the Pride Movement.

She celebrates Orange Shirt Day and discusses Reconciliation with students by watching children's shows and reading stories.

She also encourages a true love and appreciation of nature through her enthusiasm and forest school initiatives, taking the time to immerse students in the forest, outside the classroom.

Ms. Toope leads colleagues by example, helping and supporting colleagues to reach their best.

Her work reflects respect for others and acceptance of everyone.

PREMIER'S AWARD FOR TEACHING INNOVATION

Sam Paterson Brookside Intermediate, Portugal Cove-St. Philip's Sam Paterson has immersed himself heavily into Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) at Brookside Intermediate. Mr. Paterson uses technology in the classroom daily to keep lessons current. Through his passion for STEM, he has successfully created a Student Makers Club in which any student at Brookside can attend. Each week students perform new exploratory challenges using various technologies such as Ozobots, Legos, Google Suite, Jamboards, Makey Makey, Minecraft, Sphero, Green Screen, 3D Printing and Flight Simulation, just to name a few. Mr. Paterson continues to work with staff, parents/guardians, students and the community to engage students in real life educational experiences. Most recently, a group of students embarked on an Ocean-Stem fieldwork study.

During the 2020 school shutdown, Mr. Paterson worked with the students and taught them remotely using technology. He also worked with teachers to help them develop a greater online presence. This included creating a "how-to" website for staff to help them feel more comfortable when teaching online.

Mr. Paterson has become a more inclusive teacher, and his efforts have inspired new levels of engagement in students, parents and colleagues.











#### Fire Safety During Winter Storms

Winter storms are a regular part of the season in this province. Being prepared before, during and after the storm can make a big difference and help keep you and your family safe.

- Test your smoke alarms at least once a month and install carbon monoxide alarms.
- Plan two ways out of the house in case of emergency and keep the exits and driveway clear of ice and snow.
- Make sure your house number is easily seen from the roadway.
- Be ready for power outages and use extreme caution if you use candles.
- Be aware of winter weather and watch for bulletins.
- Check on your neighbors and others who may need help.
- Generators should be used outdoors and away from windows and doors.
   Never run a generator in your garage.
- Stay away from downed wires and report them to authorities asap.
- Be ready for loss of heat, and if you use an emergency heat source, keep flammable items at least 1 meter away.
- Never leave a portable heater running when you are not in the room.
   Turn them off when you go to bed.
- Keep chimneys clean and free of debris like creosote, nests, snow and ice.
   Have your chimney cleaned and inspected at least once a year.

#### IMPORTANT REMINDER:

There are more home fires in winter than in any other season. Half of all home heating fires happen in December, January and February.

As you stay cozy and warm this winter season, be fire smart!

Off-leash or unattended dogs are far more likely to be involved in tricky situations or aggressive incidents, which can easily be prevented. While understandable accidents like a dog dashing out an open front door or sneakily escaping their backyard may happen once in a while, owners must do their part to follow the rules that keep everyone safe.

Owners who keep their dog safely tethered or within an enclosed area at all times are complying with the provincial Animal Protection Act. This means keeping your dog on leash when you are walking throughout the community, as well as ensuring your dog is in a safe space or fenced yard when at home. The Town does enforce these regulations with our Animal Control Officer and the consequences for non-compliance can be severe.

The Town recognizes that off-leash play is beneficial for the health and wellbeing of your dog. Leash rules are in place to protect both dogs and people, and off-leash freedom should be exercised only with reliable dogs in designated or protected areas, like our Voisey's Brook dog parks or your own fenced yard at home.

The Town is continuing with its zero waste project "Building Strong, Healthy, and Resilient Municipalities through Zero Waste and Circularity" in collaboration with Planeet Consulting and the College of the North Atlantic. Our goal is to learn about "Circular Services" that exist in PCSP, what initiatives you would like to see in the future and developing recommendations to bring those initiatives to life. Through a series of community surveys and interviews, we have been able to gather great information, and we are excited to hear even more.

#### REPAIR

Getting clothes, electronics, furniture, etc., repaired by someone else for free or for a fee. Not doing it yourself.

#### **RECYCLE**

Getting paper, plastic, electronics, or clothing, etc., recycled by private or public organizations.

#### REUSE

Clothing swaps, buying second-hand, becoming a member of a tool library, upcycling (refashioning a piece of cloth, furniture, food packaging), etc.

#### RETURN

Bringing back packaging, bottles, or bags, etc., to the stores where you bought the products.

#### REFILL

Bringing your own containers for refills at coffee shops, food or health stores, etc.

#### ROT

Rot or composting organics by a business or community service. Not in your backyard.




