

Portugal Cove - St. Philip's Town Hall holds EMERGENCY EXERCISE

In November, the Town of Portugal Cove - St. Philip's and the Portugal Cove - St. Philip's Volunteer Fire Department held a regional Emergency Exercise in partnership with provincial Department of Justice and Public Safety. The regional exercise included the City of St. John's, City of Mt. Pearl, Town of Paradise, and Town of Conception Bay South, in which each municipality was given mock scenarios that included life and fire exercises throughout each community.

The purpose of this exercise was to test the emergency management plan for the Town, as well as the Town's emergency operation centre (EOC) and various responsibilities of the Town's respective departments and divisions. The hybrid exercise included players with table top responsibilities, and the larger players held off-site life and fire exercise throughout the Town. The exercise was met with great success, and a hot wash was held afterwards to discuss areas that may need strengthening. Town Council and staff feel that the Town is very well prepared in the event an emergency does rise in our community and beyond.

WINTER PARKING BAN

Residents are reminded that during the period from November 1st, 2023 to April 30th, 2024 both days inclusive, no person shall park, leave, or abandon any vehicle or any portion of any vehicle upon any Street Reservation within the Town **between the hours of 12:00 midnight to and including 8:00 am**; and at any time when there is a snowfall and for **12 HOURS** after the snowfall has ceased. **Vehicles left on the roadway may be subject to a ticket or be impounded at the owner's expense.**






How to be SEPTIC SMART

Do you have a septic system? Do you know how to maintain it? Here are some tips for maintaining the health of you septic system:




1) Proper maintenance is important – regular inspections can help with leak detection and it is recommended to pump out your septic system every 3-5 years.



- 3) Keep it clear It is not recommended to park or build anything (i.e. Sheds, patios etc.) over your drain field.
- 4) Accessibility know where and how to access your tank for pumping and maintenance. Also consider adding a riser to easier access with minimal or no digging.
- 5) Bacteria Septic systems have good bacteria which play an important role in digesting organic waste. Many things that go down the drain can have a negative impact on this. There are products such as septic pills and powders that can be used as supplements to boost the anaerobic bacteria.
- 6) Water leaky taps, pipes, and draining of pools etc. can lead to large or unnecessary volumes of water going into your tank. This can actually drown your field and chlorine in pools







7) Flushable Products - many products marketed to be flushable are still difficult to break down and can cause clogs and other maintenance issues. Make sure products state septic safe, including toilet paper and hygiene products. 8) What goes down the drain will end up in the septic and environment - Chemicals, soaps, detergents, bleach etc. can cause disruption to this






What NOT to put in your septic system:

good bacteria and end up in the environment.

- Fabric softeners
- **Medications**
- Bleach
- **Antibacterial soaps**
- Dish and laundry detergents with phosphates and surfactants
- **Drain cleaners**
- Fats, oil, and greases
- Hygiene products that contain oils, fragrance phthalates, phosphates and surfactants

Fire Safety During Winter Storms

Winter storms are a regular part of the season in this province. Being prepared before, during and after the storm can make a big difference and help keep you and your family safe.

- Test your smoke alarms at least once a month and install carbon monoxide alarms.
- Plan two ways out of the house in case of emergency and keep the exits and driveway clear of ice and snow.
- Make sure your house number is easily seen from the roadway.
- · Be ready for power outages and use extreme caution if you use candles.
- Be aware of winter weather and watch for bulletins.
- Check on your neighbors and others who may need help.
- Generators should be used outdoors and away from windows and doors.
 Never run a generator in your garage.
- Stay away from downed wires and report them to authorities asap.
- Be ready for loss of heat, and if you use an emergency heat source, keep flammable items at least 1 meter away.
- Never leave a portable heater running when you are not in the room.
 Turn them off when you go to bed.
- Keep chimneys clean and free of debris like creosote, nests, snow and ice.
 Have your chimney cleaned and inspected at least once a year.

IMPORTANT REMINDER:

There are more home fires in winter than in any other season. Half of all home heating fires happen in December, January and February.

As you stay cozy and warm this winter season, be fire smart!

Help Keep our Community Safe with SCHOOL BUS SAFETY TIPS





As winter weather conditions are upon us once again, all drivers are reminded to use extra caution when behind the wheel. Here are some tips to help keep everyone safe:

- 1. Drivers are required to stop when any school bus has its **red** stop signs flashing and wait until the stop sign has closed
- **2.** Parents and passengers, please wait for the bus to come to a complete stop and for its stop sign to be flashing before moving to board the bus.
- 3. When yellow lights are flashing prepare to stop
- **4.** A "School Zone" means the portion or length of highway between the two posted signs indicating a school zone, in PCSP the posted speed limit in School Zones are 30 km/hr.
- **5.** Drivers travelling in both directions in all traffic lanes (this means single, double, triple lanes on either side) must come to a complete stop when the school bus has its red lights flashing and stop sign out.

Did you know? You can be fined between \$500 - \$1,200 for illegally passing a school bus and speeding in a school zone can lead to vehicle impoundment and fines from \$400 - \$1,800 and up to six demerit points (Source: gov.nl.ca)

Did you know? There are over 500 students who attend daily classes in PCSP and use the school bus to get to their classes safely.

Did you know? Every school bus has danger zones! The danger zone is the 10 foot area around the bus in every direction. The most dangerous areas of the bus are the front of the bus and the right rear tire area.

Did you know? You can report unsafe driving around school busses with the RNC's online reporting tool



Even if you already have a civic number sign on your property, where is it located? On your garbage box? On a pole or a tree? On your door? You might know where it is, but first responders don't. In an emergency situation, they need to be able to find you quickly and easily. When you sign up for safety, your reflective number sign will lead first responders straight to you or your family when you need them.

Tax invoices were mailed during the **first week of January 2024.** If you have not received your tax bill, please contact **ar@pcsp.ca**

- Property owner(s) are responsible for ensuring the Town has their current mailing address on file.
- Property owner(s) are responsible for understanding their tax and interest obligations regardless of any error in the issuance of notification from the Town.
- Payment deadline is March 31, 2024
- Taxes not paid in full by the due date, are subject to a one percent (1%) compounded interest rate
 which will be applied on the first day of every month. Accounts with a balance forward in January
 for the prior years' taxes, may be subject to collection measures, recovery and legal action.
